



## **A parade in District 9 celebrates the Year of Traffic Safety**

*March 10, 2012*

2012 was declared Year of Traffic Safety by the Vietnamese government. Ho Chi Minh City's District 9 is collaborating with Asia Injury Prevention (AIP) Foundation to play an active role in the initiative. On March 10<sup>th</sup>, a parade of hundreds of people marched through the District, showing their support of a year dedicated to road safety—and demanding safer roads for their communities.

Traffic accidents are an alarming problem throughout Vietnam, and the government is committed to reducing the numbers of road victims in 2012. Last year, 10,950 people were killed nationwide, many of which were children, who are among the most vulnerable road users<sup>1</sup>.

To combat this issue, AIP Foundation runs road safety education programs and campaigns throughout the country. The Year of Traffic Safety has allowed them to boost their work as they collaborate closely with the government at the national and local level.

“This parade is a local component of our three year national public awareness campaign which encourages child helmet use, “Children **also** need a helmet”,” explains AIP Foundation Executive Director Mirjam Sidik. “Through our school programs, billboards, television spots, workshops, and public events, people are gradually becoming aware of the dangers they face and the alternatives that exist.”

The parade brought together hundreds of people showing their support and demanding unified action: District 9 People's Committee members, the Bureau of Education and Training, the women and youth associations of District 9, and hundreds of parents, teachers, and students. 500 t-shirts bore the phrase “District 9 supports Traffic Safety Year 2012” and the national child helmet campaign logo. Banners and slogans also broadcasted urgent road safety messages.

“The event started by the front gate of our building,” said Ms. Le Thi Hong Lien from People's Committee. “Organizing this parade was a way for us to show our citizens that we are deeply committed to decreasing the number of road traffic victims during the Year of Traffic Safety. Everybody wants to protect their loved ones, and today we are announcing this loud and clear.”

Accompanied by 40 motorbikes and several trucks, the parade walked past the Ha Noi Highway, Thu Duc Crossroads, Le Van Viet Road, and arrived at the district's Children House. Local traffic police ensured a safe and smoothly run event.
